
We look forward to seeing everyone back at school on Tuesday 22nd April for the start of term 2. Have a very safe and happy Easter and school holiday period.

The Big Six

Research has shown that there are six key components to successful beginning reading. Because of their importance, they have become known as 'The Big Six': oral language, phonological awareness, phonics, vocabulary, fluency, and comprehension.

Last week we learnt about Vocabulary this week we are looking at Phonics.



How Does Phonics Help with Reading?


Phonics builds on phonological awareness. During phonics lessons at school, children learn to connect the sound or phoneme to the letter of the alphabet or group of letters that is used to represent it.

How Can Parents Help?

- Teach children to write their names. Use a capital letter at the beginning and lowercase for the rest of the letters. Write it for them and let them trace it, copy it, make it from play dough or draw it in sand.
- Point out words and letters when reading together. 'There's the letter M, it says mmm for Mummy. Can you see the S that says sss for Sam?'
- Encourage children to find the letters in their names or the names of family members in other places, such as books, signs, product packaging, and shop windows.
- Point out different fonts and ways to write the same letter when reading and in your local environment.

As we spend time together during the Easter holidays, it's a great opportunity to talk to your child about cyber safety, especially if they can access a phone, tablet, or computer at home.

Online safety is an essential topic, and your role at home is crucial in helping your child navigate the digital world securely. Here are a few key points we recommend to ensure your child uses the internet safely:

- •Set clear rules about which websites and apps are appropriate for your child, and be aware of what these apps/websites involve.
- •Encourage your child to never share personal information—like their name, address, or school—while online.
- •Use parental device controls to help limit screen time and monitor online activities. Regularly check their activity and discuss any concerns with your child.
- •Most importantly, keep communication open with your child. Check in with them regularly about what they're doing or seeing online and create an environment where they feel comfortable asking questions if something feels off. By promoting respectful online behaviour and raising awareness, we can work together to ensure our children are safe and positive in their online interactions.

We can take care of it, I could feed it and we could buy the tank.


This is why I think we should have a class pet.

Secondly isn't it clear that the blue light is terrible for your eyes. Now it can worsen the eyesight from staring into a screen. It also can give you sleep deprivation.



If you receive an enrolment offer, you should accept the offer by Friday, 22 August 2025.





Digital Enrolment

Parent/Carer Quick Reference Guide

Enrolling your child is quick and easy using your laptop or desktop

Before you begin



Google Chrome is the recommended browser



Ensure your listed Emergency contact is someone **other than** Adult A or Adult B



Use of a laptop or desktop is recommended



Check your details are complete **before** submitting

You can't edit after submission



Use the **Save** button if you need to walk away



Have all your digital documents ready as they must be uploaded to your application

e.g. Birth certificate, Proof of Address, Proof of Residency

Finding your designated neighbourhood school

Use <u>Find My School</u> to view a map of available government schools in your area, including your designated neighbourhood (local) school.

Register for an account

- Click the following link: https://students.educationapps.vic.gov.au/s/
- Scroll down and select Register
- 3. Read the acknowledgement and select Continue
- 4. Enter the requested details
- 5. A verification email will be sent to your inbox (check spam folder)
- 6. Click the link that has been emailed to you to complete registration
- 7. You will be prompted to set a new password
- 8. Select Change Password
- 9. You will land on the portal homepage





Ongoing access to the portal

- 1. Select the following link: https://students.educationapps.vic.gov.au/s/
- 2. Enter your credential details
- 3. Select Log in
- When logging in on a new device, you will be prompted for a verification code
 - · check your email for the code
 - · enter code and select Verify
- 5. You will land on the portal homepage
- 6. To log out, navigate to the drop-down menu and select Logout





Submitting an application

- 1. From the portal homepage, select Apply
- 2. Enter new school application details
- Read the privacy notice and then select Continue
- 4. Enter details for each section (including documentation upload)
- Read Review and Declaration and check all details have been provided and are correct

Note: Once an enrolment enquiry is submitted, enrolment details cannot be edited via the Portal


- Select Submit
- 7. The Application Submission screen will appear and then select Close
- 8. You will be taken to your application list




Viewing, withdrawing or adding files to an application

1. In the portal, select application number to view details, including status



- You can monitor the application status along the top status bar, view application details, withdraw the application or view and upload files
 - To withdraw: select Withdraw Application, enter a reason and the application will be closed
 - To add files: select Add Files at the bottom of the browser and follow instructions

Accepting or not accepting an enrolment offer


IMPORTANT NOTE: Please only accept ONE enrolment offer. All enrolments **must** be accepted via the portal.

- When a school makes an offer of enrolment, you will be notified by email and the status in the portal will be updated
- Select the link in the email, and you will be redirected to the portal
- 3. In the portal, My Applications will display Place Offered
- 4. Select application number
- Select Accept Offer to accept the enrolment offer (only accept ONE) and you will be prompted to provide additional information
- 6. Read the privacy notice and select Continue to proceed
- 7. Enter details for each section (including documentation upload)
- 8. Click Submit
- When the school finalises the application, you will be notified by email notification and the status in the portal will be updated
- 10. If you received multiple enrolment offers, or you no longer wish to proceed with your enrolment application:
 - select Do Not Accept (for each offer to be declined)
 - enter a reason and the application will be closed

NOTE: Your personal and health information will be shared with the school once you have accepted an enrolment offer.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- · \$154 for primary school students
- \$256 for secondary school students

HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from the website below.

If you applied for CSEF at your child's school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- **new student enrolments**: your child has started or changed schools this year.
- changed family circumstances: such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing this year.
